Year 9 Drama Curriculum

Introduction

Our year 9 Drama Curriculum aims to:

- To consolidate students' drama skills and knowledge.
- To prepare students for GCSE Drama.
- To develop students' critical thinking and analysis skills.
- To foster students' understanding of the role of drama in society and culture.

Curriculum Content:

1. Melodrama into Naturalistic Theatre:

- Movement and physical expression: character motivation and development.
- The history of melodrama becoming naturalistic.
- Voice and diction: Improve voice and diction, including articulation, projection, and intonation.
- Acting techniques: Learn and practice a variety of acting techniques, such as Stanislavski's method applied to a play by Chekov or Strindberg.

2. The Royal Court Theatre - Actioning:

• The history of the Royal Court Theatre and Max Stafford Clark.

3. Theatre of the Absurd:

• Absurdism: Explore the characteristics of absurdism in theatre, including existentialism, nihilism, and the absurd.



4. Musical theatre:

- I Explore the elements of musical theatre, including songs, dance, and dialogue.
- Creating and performing pieces in different styles: Create and perform pieces in a variety of styles, incorporating elements from realism, absurdism, and musical theatre.

Term 3:

- Creating and performing a devised piece: Create and perform a devised piece that works towards meeting requirements of the GCSE coursework.
- Analysing and evaluating a set text: Analyse and evaluate a set text, focusing on its themes, characters, and dramatic techniques.
- Exam preparation: Practice answering exam questions and develop strategies for effective exam performance.

Learning Objectives:

By the end of Year 9, students will be able to:

- Use a wide range of dramatic techniques to create and perform complex characters and stories.
- Work independently and collaboratively to create and perform original plays.
- Analyse and evaluate their own and others' performances critically.
- Understand the role of drama in different cultures and historical periods.

Assessment:

- Students will be assessed through a variety of methods, including:
- Performances
- Individual / Group work
- Observations
